Black History Month celebrates the contributions of African Americans to the United States.

It honors all Black people from all periods of U.S. history, from the enslaved people first brought over from Africa in the early 17th century to African Americans living in the United States today.

Black History Month is also a time to consider how we can create more justice in our daily lives, how we can help educational institutions become places in which all the students they serve, especially African American students, thrive and how we can make sure that all families, particularly those from African American backgrounds, feel welcome in all aspects of life. 


