Let's briefly look at the FOCUS of Stewardship

- Stewardship is based on the individual's need to give out of gratitude rather than the Church's need to receive—it is a spiritual way of life...a conversion process that changes lives.
- Stewardship is Intentional, Planned and Proportionate giving.
- Stewardship is based on the fact that each of us has been given unique gifts and talents from God. It is part of our calling to discern, develop and use those gifts.
- Stewardship is part of our own Religious Education.
- Stewardship is giving of the *first fruits* of our time, talent and treasure.


Let's briefly look at the FOCUS of Stewardship

- Stewardship of time involves first our time spent with God in prayer and sacrament, then the time spent in service to others.
- Stewardship should embrace all aspects of our life...Family, Church, Community.
- Stewardship is about putting God FIRST in our lives. Our calendars and checkbooks tell our story.
- Stewardship involves TRUST in God's will.
- Stewardship is PROACTIVE.
- Stewardship brings a sense of personal joy and fulfillment to life.

• The question remains: How can we establish a parish environment that will encourage people to live stewardship as a way of life?

Best Practices in Parish Stewardship

- 1. Be a welcoming parish
- 2. Appoint a stewardship council
- 3. Include stewardship as vital part of parish plan
- 4. Emphasize stewardship in all parish formation and education programs
- 5. Provide the opportunity for lay witness presentations
- 6. Encourage parishioners to make a pledge
- 7. Communicate with parishioners on stewardship
- 8. Remember, good stewardship starts in the parish house



Role of the Pastor

"A pastor's prayerful meditations on Christian stewardship should precede the start of a parish stewardship program. Prayer becomes a potent and precious resource for the process because the primary objective in stewardship education is always a renewal of commitment to Christian discipleship."

"To be successful, the pastor must make a <u>complete</u>, <u>constant</u>, <u>personal</u> <u>and official commitment</u> to stewardship as a constitutive element of Christian discipleship."

Forming a Stewardship Committee (Zech #2)

- Under parish pastoral council
- Responsible for stewardship awareness and annual stewardship efforts
- NOT under the auspices of parish finance council
- Number of members varies due to size of parish



Committee Member Profile

- Spiritually motivated
- Exemplify and live out stewardship....give generously of their time, talent and treasure
- Envision and define where stewardship can take the parish
- Possess qualities to ensure success accountable, optimistic, persistent, creative, willing to share their faith

Responsibilities of a Stewardship Committee *<u>bolded are the 20+ steps to carry out stewardship in a parish</u>

- Develop an Annual Plan (Zech #3)
- Prepare a time and talent listing or catalog of parish activities (keep it current)
- Provide opportunities for gifts discernment
 - Living Your Strengths Workshops (Gallup) catholicstrengthsinstitute.org
 - Called and Gifted Workshops (Catherine of Sienna Institute)

- Carry out the stewardship effort of time, talent and treasure on an annual basis
 - Timing/Planning
 - Lay Witness Testimonies/Weekend (Zech #5)
 - Letters/Brochures/Commitment Cards/Giving Guides (Zech #6)
 - Homilies
 - Ministry Fairs
 - In-pew Ask
 - Follow-up (make sure people are contacted)
 - Commissioning Sunday

- Develop a hospitality or welcoming program (Zech #1)
- Ensure hospitality/community building activities occur on a regular basis throughout the year





• Educate and evangelize (Zech #4)

- Parish leaders annual training and greater focus on prayer
- Stewardship in faith formation programs for children, teens and adults
- RCIA
- Parish Stewardship Mission
- How to move to increasing level of commitment of time, talent and treasure (take a step)
- Children's stewardship component
- In-service and continuing education to stewardship committee

- Communicate throughout the year (Zech #7)
 - Stewardship thoughts in parish bulletin, brochures, newsletters, homilies, prayers of the faithful
 - Accountability by sharing a state of the parish annual report that includes financials as well as faith and service activities (Zech #8)
 - To invite parishioners to continue participation and transformation (permeate the message throughout the year
 - Use website and other social media





- Show appreciation to those involved with parish ministry (including clergy)
 - Thank you calls
 - Thank you handwritten notes
 - Thank you letters
 - Thank you events
 - Thank you gifts
 - Thank you email (general)
 - Thank you email (personal)
 - Thank you bulletin announcement
 - Thank you robo call
 - Thank you visit
 - Thank you for estate gift
 - Lay leader thank you calls
 - Highlight volunteers in bulletin
- Evaluate the annual plan each year
- Expand your focus beyond the parish





Each of these 20+ areas of responsibility have detailed work to be done. Let me just share what 2 of these areas can look like.

Hospitality and Community Building Activities -Welcoming the New Parishioner

We provide 19 different ideas of things parishes have done to welcome new parishioners.

A few examples below:

- Trained greeters at Mass make a special effort to welcome all parishioners and newcomers.
- Pastor sends a welcome letter and/or makes a personal phone call.
- Make it a point to extend a personal invitation to parish activities for the first 6 months.

On-going Hospitality Activities

We provide 24 different ideas of things parishes have done to provide ongoing hospitality to parishioners.

A few examples below:

- Remember parishioner's special days (birthday, anniversary, awards, honors, etc.).
- Send a "Thank-You" to your spouse and family, who often take on additional responsibilities at home so you can share your time and talent with your parish.
- Phone calls by ministry leaders or staff to reach out to those who have not been to Mass recently.

On-going Community Building Activities

We provide 27 different ideas of things parishes have done to provide ongoing community building activities for parishioners.

A few examples below:

- Provide on-going community building activities such as parish picnics, pancake breakfasts, pot-luck dinners, holiday celebrations, parish festivals and Lenten soup suppers.
- Have receptions to celebrate special events such as First Communion, Confirmation, RCIA, etc.
- Build community through service events, such as meal packaging events, Habitat for Humanity home builds, neighborhood food pantry collections, various collections for special drives for the needy, etc.

Personal Hospitality

- Recite the following prayer daily or regularly "Lord take me today to someone or someones in need."
- 2. Pay attention to others around you, as you don't know what they are going through. Look out for a connection.
- 3. Be sure to say "hello" to those you encounter as you may be the only person who greets them that day.
- 4. Notice personal talents of those around you and encourage them to use those talents.

Personal Hospitality

- 5. Keep in touch with those who are hurting or in need. If we were ever given the opportunity to know what all the members of our parishes are going through, we would be overwhelmed with their challenges.
- 6. Pray for others.
- 7. Invite people to become engaged in the parish in some way.
- 8. Have hope-filled conversations.
- 9. Thank people.

Expand your focus beyond the parish

International Level – Uganda Mission work by Blessed Trinity Parish, Ocala, Florida

- It started in 2003 with a picture of a stick church in Sr. Juliet's hometown of Nalweyo, Uganda and a promise to build a much-needed bigger church.
- Sister Juliet works at Blessed Trinity parish ministering to the sick.



Since 2004 they have:


